Mayor and City Council "Push-In" For Fire Department

On Friday, June 17th, the City of Fairburn hosted a traditional fire service dedication of its new Pierce Arrow XT Engine.

City Administrators and staff 'pushed in' the new fire engine with Fire Chief Cornelius Robinson and fire team. The "Push-In" is a memorable ceremony and tradition that dates back to the 1800s when firefighters relied on horse-drawn steamer engines.

"Historically, fire engines were attached pumps drawn by horses. Horses would not back in, so once detached, firemen pushed the machines into the station, "explains Fairburn Fire Chief Cornelius Robinson.

In recognition of this tradition, community members joined in the festivities, honoring Squad 22, with participants praying over and dedicating the new engine. "This is another step in the right direction for our City. This new engine replaces our aging fleet, enhancing safety and response," commented Mayor Mario Avery.

"With the addition of Squad 22, this will allow for greater coverage of the Senoia Road/Hwy 74 corridor, our Business District, and interstate Hwy 85," explained Chief Robinson.

Water Assistance Available to Fairburn Residents

The Low-Income Home Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is available to all income eligible households in Fulton County and the City of Atlanta. The program offers a payment of \$200 or \$300 once per program year to be applied to your household drinking or sewage bill. Applicants must be a customer of an approved vendor. Required documents include:

- Current water bill
- Proof of income for the last 30 days for all occupants over 18
- Social Security cards for all household members
- Valid Photo ID (Driver's License, Permanent Resident Card, Passport, etc.)

CDC warns, "Stay Cool." Ways to beat the heat

High temperatures kill hundreds of people every year. Heatrelated deaths and illness are preventable, yet more than 700 people die from extreme heat.

People at greatest risk for heat-related illness can take the following protective actions to prevent illness or death:

- Stay in air-conditioned buildings as much as you can. Air-conditioning is the number one way to protect yourself against heat-related illness and death. If your home is not air-conditioned, reduce your risk for heatrelated illness by spending time in public facilities that are air-conditioned and using air conditioning in vehicles. Contact your local health department or locate an air-conditioned shelter in your area.
- Do not rely on a fan as your main cooling device during an extreme heat
- Drink more water than usual and don't wait until you're thirsty to drink.
- Check on a friend or neighbor and have someone do the same for you.
- Don't use the stove or oven to cook—it will make you and your house hotter.
