

## Fairburn Police Department emerges as elite force against crime

Every day the men and women of Fairburn's police are in the community, helping citizens. Whether responding to emergency calls or merely acting as a mentor to youth, Fairburn's police force relies on the science and art of policing to promote community engagement and reduce crime. A model implemented by the City of Fairburn Police Chief Stoney Mathis, who promised a 10% percent reduction when he initially interviewed for the job, is resulting in tremendous results and aligns with the state of Georgia's certification process to meet 129 policing standards. ## Fairburn Pastor offers 'food for thought'

Walking into First Baptist Church of Fairburn, one is greeted by several smiling faces from various nationalities and walks of life. It is a Thursday morning, already volunteers and staff have an assembly line of people, filling a room of boxes with food. Pastor Evan Hill, the lead pastor, is there, gesturing to meet the team that makes sure that the food for their community provisions, never runs out. A regular mainstay, the feeding pantry at the church serves individuals and families twice a week, from 1:00 pm - 4:00pm. Jennie, one of the program directors and the pastor's assistant, explains that the need has more than doubled since the global pandemic, demonstrating the ongoing impacts of COVID-19. However, the main story is not the food pantry, but the focus of the ministry on diversity and sharing the gospel in a meaningful way that relies on "intentional relationship building," with all people regardless of race, religion, or creed.

The Fairburn community reflects families of a changing demographic, such as the growing Hispanic community, where the church provides English as a Second Language class every Tuesday at 7:00 pm. Pastor Deris Coto was appointed over Hispanic Ministries by Pastor Hill, offering services in Spanish every Sunday at 11:00 am. Pastor Hill believes there is value in being in the downtown Historic Commercial District because the area is thriving, with opportunities around the city to promote spiritual growth, respond to social issues as they arise, while also offering programs that support family building. Pastor Hill emphasizes with his staff and members that establishing partnerships with Fairburn's schools, taking socioeconomic disparities head-on, and ongoing community engagement are vital to ensuring that the church reflects the community in which it serves.

Pastor Hill is a native of Georgia who grew up in Tifton, graduated from Mercer University in Macon, and later received additional degrees from Wake Forest at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. He is married to Christi; a graduate of Clemson University and they have three children. Pastor Hill believes that the "Gospel can change people," shares his commitment to missions and feeding those in needs, and is building a family of believers through sharing the 'beauty of Christ despite the brokenness of this world."

Red Velvet Tookies in time for Thristmas!

Ingredients for Red Velvet Cookies: 12-oz package Sugar Cookie Mix 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, softened 1 egg 1/3 cup cocoa powder 4 oz cream cheese, softened 3 tsp red coloring

Ingredients for the cream cheese frosting: 4 oz cream cheese, softened -2 tsp butter, softened -1 cup powdered sugar -2-3 tablespoon milk -1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

How to make Red Velvet Cookies with Cream Cheese Frosting By Butter with a Side of Bread www.butterwithasideofbread.com

Preheat your oven to 375 degrees and in a medium-sized bowl, stir together the cookie mix, butter, egg, cream cheese, and the red food coloring until they are well blended. On a parchment-lined baking sheet, place rounded tablespoons of cookie dough at least 2 inches apart.

Spray the bottom of a glass with nonstick cooking spray and gently press down on the cookies to flatten them into 2.5-inch diameter circles. Bake for 9-10 minutes and let the cookies cool completely. To make the cream cheese frosting, beat together the cream cheese and butter with an electric mixer until they are smooth. Add in the powdered sugar, milk, and vanilla. Continue mixing until smooth.

## Christmas Tree



As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.

#### PICKING THE TREE

Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.

#### PLACING THE TREE

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.

#### LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

#### **After Christmas**

Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.

Check with your local community to find a recycling program. Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

#### FACTS

- More than one of every four home Christmas tree fires is caused by electrical problems.
- Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious.

A heat source too close to the tree causes one in every four of the fires.

Community policing is a proven policing strategy that offers full-service interaction, which became popular in the United States in the late 1960s as cities were seeking to repair the division caused by segregation and discriminatory policies. Chief Mathis relies heavily on building relationships with members of the neighborhoods, "providing outstanding police service to the community and promote a peaceful living environment for residents."

Formerly, the Chief of Police for Chattahoochee Hills, Chief Mathis' move to Fairburn was that he believes he can make a difference by promoting effective policing methods throughout the department. With an emphasis on community engagement, crime reduction occurs as citizens become active in their communities and responsive to police. While sceptics may have scoffed at his promise of a 10% percent reduction, crime statistics show that the Fairburn Police achieved have exceeded their original goals in the first year. Subsequently, with this year's crime reduction rate of 34% percent, they are tracking toward a 50% percent overall reduction rate.

## Fairburn student wins over bullying, sharing 'Overcoming' affirmations for girls



Going to school is a rite of passage that many children enjoy. It is a place where we learn and begin developing our social skills. As a young second grader, typically, students are learning grammar, math, science, arts, and the windows of learning are not only opening but filled with anticipation. What we do not expect to encounter but is becoming a growing reality for students is to be bullied. Such was the case for Nevaeh Hart, a beautiful young student who recalls experiencing bullying at the early age of seven years old. The bullying became so extreme that she wanted to take her own life.

The emotional impact of being ridiculed and teased led Nevaeh down a path where she was ultimately hospitalized and received continual therapy.

According to parent and teacher resources site, Teach.com, up to 90% percent of student's report bullying before they reach the eighth grade. Experts say that parents, school staff, and other adults in the community are vital in helping the community prevent bullying and to help build safe school environments. Help for students begins with them sharing that they're experiencing with bullying with their parents. Schools can help through training and helping all students and staff understand the public health approach to bullying and prevention. Our communities help by ensuring that we support a zero-tolerance policy on bullying and laws to protect children and encourage greater tolerance.

Raina Knox did just that when it came to help for her daughter Nevaeh, in overcoming the bullying she encountered. Knox, led by example, is a potent force for her daughter. As a published author, she shared with Nevaeh that she could share her feelings through writing, which is what Nevaeh did. It started with a journal that she later developed into a story about a young girl named Emma, who finds her voice by overcoming bullying. It is a remarkable story about determination from a 10-year old student who has fought her way back, positively, to a place of peace and happiness.

#### HOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

#### HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.

- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.






Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Turn off all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.


#### FACTS
