Greetings! Successful governance relies on coordination among our governmental entities at the local, county, state, and national levels. Through my leadership, Fairburn has a strong relationship with our governmental partners to ensure we always receive our fair allocations of funding, infrastructure investment, educational resources, and businesses grants. The City of Fairburn received CARES Act funds in the amount of \$699,00.00. Some of the funds were used for hazard pay for the city's

frontline workers and PPEs for the City and citizens. We have received \$3.1 million dollars of the \$6.2 million American Rescue Plan Act funds which is allocated for broadband upgrades, infrastructure improvements, and community initiatives that include rental and utility assistance, support for small businesses, and more. The remaining \$3.1 million dollars of the American Rescue Plan Act will be received in 2022.

In October, we celebrate Georgia Cities week with the Georgia Municipal Association. We dedicate this issue to our citizens, employees, elected officials, and all of us who work together to make our city great. We are showcasing city services, including public safety, emerging arts, entertainment, and activities in our downtown business district.

We will host a panel discussion with educational leaders regarding *Conversations That Matter: Learning & Resilience*, to assist with housing, address educational disparities, community policing, and more. We will recognize winners from our Art & Education Essay Contest as well. I believe that Fairburn's youth, and those young at heart, are inspiring for their resilience and tenacity.

Their contributions to our city through the performance and visual arts, music, athletics, academics, and more give us all hope as we move forward and beyond together!
